

What/Why of Vote Centers

What is a Vote Center?

C.R.S. 1-1-104 (49.8)

"Vote center" means a polling place at which any registered elector in the political subdivision holding the election may vote, regardless of the precinct in which the elector resides.

Why Vote Centers?

- Cost savings under HAVA
- ADA compliant facilities
- Fewer judges needed/easier to manage
- Paper ballots/electronic voting ideal
- Connects pollbook/registration data electronically

Why Vote Centers?

- May increase turnout
- Voters love the convenience
- Poll watching easier
- Offers options (absentee/early/Election Day)

Larimer County concept leads way for efficient, easy voting

Larimer County voters appeared to roundly endorse the voting center concept on Election

Tuesday was third election that Larimer County used vote centers — 31 sites located throughout the country where voters could cast their ballots. Larimer Country is the only country in the nation that currently uses the centers, which allow eligible voters to cast ballots anywhere in Larimer Country.

The model in Latimer County is tossed or making voting and counting ballots more efficient, cost-effective and more secure than using dozens of precinct locations. Of 185.045 active voters in Latimer County

145,052, or a phenomenal 93.5 percent, ca lots Tuesday.

County elections officials were well prepared with adequate staffing and information. While lines were long because of the record urnout, most residents reported a wait of less than 30 minutes, which is much less than other counties reported. Larimer County elections workers were able to check the status of each voter via an electronic roll book.

A few unavoidable glitches were reported including a computer breakdown in Welling ton, but for the most part, voters made it to th voting booths in a reasonable manner.

The vote centers also save taxpayers mone because they require fewer workers and volunteers than do precincts. County officials alswere able to post voting results quickly on the county Web site at www.larisner.org, with un official final results in by Illi6 p.m. Tuesday.

This election has seen much rancor and criticism about government as well as concernabout the elections process. Larimer County'svoting center concept, however, is a positive example of what government can and should do for the people.







PERSPECTIVE

Election Day gremlins

Larimer County has pioneered what could become a watershed innovation in elections: vote centers. Instead of having 190 precinct polling places with all their inherent problems, officials created 31 vote centers throughout the county. Voters could vote at any center.

Many other Colorado counties – and, indeed, many other states that were watching Larimer this November – are eager to switch to this cheaper, more efficient, more secure, more professional and more controlled model. The day may even be approaching in the not-so-distant future that Colorado could have statewide voting centers.

Legislation

Legislation 1-5-102.7. Combining precincts and polling places - vote centers.

- 1-5-102.7. Combining precincts and polling places vote centers.
- (1) Notwithstanding any provision of section 1-5-101, 1-5-102, or 1-5-102.5, a designated election official may combine polling places or precincts or establish one or more vote centers for any election, subject to approval by the board of county commissioners. A designated election official who combines polling places or precincts or establishes a vote center shall publish the location of polling places pursuant to section 1-5-205.
- (2) If vote centers are used in an election in a political subdivision, precinct polling places shall not also be used in the election in that political subdivision, unless each precinct polling place has a secure electronic connection to provide voting information to and receive voting information from the computerized registration book maintained by the county clerk and recorder.
- (3) If vote centers are used in a general election in a county with a population of twenty-five thousand or more active registered electors, there shall be at least one vote center for every ten thousand active registered electors; except that the secretary of state may waive this requirement for a county before the election at the request of the county clerk and recorder.
- (4) Each vote center used in a county shall have a secure electronic connection to the computerized registration book maintained by the county clerk and recorder permitting all voting information processed by any computer at a vote center to be immediately accessible to all other computers at all vote centers in the county. A county may not use vote centers in an election unless the secretary of state has certified that the secure electronic connection is sufficient to prevent any elector from voting more than once and to prevent unauthorized access to the computerized registration book.

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Legislation Cont. 1-5-102.7. Combining

precincts and polling places - vote centers.

- (5) The number, location, and manner of operation and location of vote centers, including providing for poll watching activities, shall be determined by the designated election official in consultation with the chairpersons of the county central committees of the major political parties and a representative of the county organization of any minor political party.
- (6) Each vote center shall meet all the requirements of federal and state law applicable to polling places, except as such requirements of state law are modified by this section.
- (7) The designated election official of a political subdivision shall not establish vote centers for a general election unless vote centers were used in a previous election held by the political subdivision in an odd-numbered year or in a primary election held on or after January 1, 2006.
- **(8)** (a) In elections held before January 1, 2006, the election judges shall make one certificate for each vote center in the form required by section 1-7-601.
- (b) In elections held on and after January 1, 2006, the use of vote centers in an election shall not affect the duty of the election judges to make a certificate for each precinct in accordance with section 1-7-601.
