Overview

- In 2004, the Colorado Legislature identified Vote Centers as an Election Day option- an alternative to traditional polling places or mail ballot elections
- The EPC Clerk & Recorder's office determined the need to study the concept and to create a diverse Task Force
- The EPC Vote Center Task Force met during the first three months of 2005
- Task Force consensus will be included in the Clerk & Recorder's recommendations to the BOCC regarding the 2005 Coordinated Election

Larimer County (Ft. Collins) conducted Colorado's first Vote Center Elections in November 2003, August 2004, and November 2004.

Project Goals

- Create Vote Center Task Force (VCTF)
- Study the Vote Center concept
- Compare Vote Centers to Polling Place and Mail Ballot Elections
- Summarize VCTF findings
- Present options for November 2005
 Coordinated Election to Board of County
 Commissioners

VCTF Schedule

- January 13, 2005 Initial VCTF meeting
- By weekly meetings (6 total)- with daily and weekly Election
 Department and support staff research
- February 1, 2005 Field trip to Larimer County
- March 24, 2005 Final VCTF meeting
- April 25, 2005 Present written Report on November 2005 election options to Board of County Commissioners
- May 2, 2005 Discuss report at BOCC meeting and reach decision on type of election to conduct in November 2005 (Polling Place, Mail-Ballot, Vote Center)

VCTF Conclusions (Primary Pros)

- Vote where it's convenient; no wrong place to vote
- Fewer\Election Judges needed (source of many errors)
- Full-time staff at all voting locations
- Will prepare for continued growth in County
- Best argument for obtaining DRE funding

VCTF Conclusions (Primary Cons)

- Lack of results by precinct (still required by law in '06)
- Eliminates social aspect of precinct polling places
- All ballot styles (paper) required at all locations (w/o DREs)
- Potentially high cost initial investment and on-going
- Potential for computer hacking (connectivity issues)

VCTF Conclusions (Based on survey & comments)

- Fewer Election Judges are required for Vote Centers
- Election Judges need additional training in any election
- Primary Logistical Vote Center concerns (in order):
 - #1 Budget
 - #2 Locations
 - #3 Connectivity
 - #4 Reporting

VCTF Conclusions (Based on survey & comments)

- There are long-term benefits to consider transitioning to Vote Centers at a future date
- There are adequate facilities throughout El Paso County to host Vote Centers
- Vote Centers provide a better way to manage and insure a fair and honest election
- Absentee & Early Voting participation would remain the same if we had Vote Centers
- Election Judges will make an easy transition to processing voters at Vote Centers
- El Paso County citizens would accept the Vote Center Concept, with proper education
- Vote Centers are the most expeditious manner to meet HAVA & State requirements
- Vote Centers would decrease number of Provisional Ballots cast
- Vote Centers would reduce the amount of voter fraud
- Vote Centers are a more convenient way for voters to cast their ballot
- Vote Centers with Touch Screens (DREs) would greatly enhance Vote Centers
- The biggest obstacle to conducting a Vote Center Elections may be the budget
- 2005 Election preferences (in order): Polling Place, Mail-Ballot, and Vote Centers
- Additional knowledge of the election process was gained through the VCTF
- The Vote Center Task Force Process was a positive learning experience (100%)

Vote Centers

\$ 1.24-1.7 million*

\$ 807,698

*Includes one-time initial costs \$ 461,000
